If we have to cancel a trip, we will do our best to contact you by telephone **before the departure time.** In all such cases (including cancellations due to any COVID-19 restrictions), a full refund will be provided.

If you need to cancel your booking on a trip, **let iTICKET know as early as possible.** There is a no cancellation/no refund policy with iTICKET so we suggest you consider that when booking.

In extenuating circumstances, a refund request can be lodged with iTICKET who will consult with the Trust for authorisation of a refund request.

Any refunds will be processed as soon as they are approved.

No refunds are paid at the Whanganui I-Site Visitor Centre.

### **COMING ON OUR TRIPS**

We want people to enjoy themselves on the Whanganui Summer Programme so plan our events accordingly. Our bus trips allow for rest stops en route, especially where long journeys are involved. On some trips you will need to be prepared to spend much of the day outdoors, away from the bus.

**Transport Information.** All our bus trips depart from the bus stop at 29 Taupo Quay, in front of the Tram Shed next to the Whanganui i-SITE Visitor Centre. Some events such as talks, guided walks and museum events have different departure or meeting points as noted in the trip descriptions. Note there is plenty of free all-day parking in Rutland Street and around Pākaitore Moutoa Gardens. The public toilets beside the Tram Shed are open 24/7. Please make sure you arrive at least 15 minutes before the departure time for all events and report to the trip leader who will mark your name on the booking sheet or take your payment if no booking is necessary.

It may be possible to arrange for the bus to pick you up en route, e.g. just past the St John's Hill shops, beside the tennis courts at the junction of Wanganui Road and SH3 in Turakina (note this is a change from previous years), by the primary school on SH3 in Bulls, opposite the Z Service Station on SH3 in Sanson, at the Tranzit Depot on Calico Line in Marton, by the Museum on SH1 in Hunterville, at the railway station in Taihape, opposite the library on SH3 in Waverley or at the i-SITE in Hawera depending on the trip destination. Other points may be able to be arranged on request. Please ask the i-SITE what arrangements can be made for your trip.

We use Tranzit Coachlines air-conditioned buses. Tranzit provide drivers for our bus trips.

We endeavour to return by the advertised time but delays are possible, so avoid making other commitments close to the return time. Please check you have all your belongings with you before you leave the bus. We do keep a lost property box at the i-SITE but only while the programme is in operation.

What do I need to bring? Remember that trips can be subject to rapidly changing weather conditions.

### For ALL trips you need to bring:

- Food for the duration of the trip. For a full-day trip bring your lunch as well as morning and afternoon tea. If food is being provided as part of the event, this will be noted in the trip description. Some trips allow for a snack stop on the way back, so you may want to bring money for ice creams or drinks.
- · Water and other drinks as required.
- · Sun hat and sunscreen.
- Any medication you require including insect repellent.
- Face mask if required (or desired) on public transport at the time of your trip.

### For trips where you will be venturing away from the bus for much of the day make sure

- Solid footwear (not jandals). We recommend you always wear sturdy shoes.
- · A warm, waterproof jacket.
- A small day pack to carry all your gear.
- A walking pole may be helpful.
- · Binoculars if appropriate.

Fitness requirements. Most trips do not involve long walks but others may involve walking uphill, through grassland or over rough ground. The trip description notes any special requirements but do check with the i-SITE if you are unsure whether your level of fitness will suit your preferred trip. We do not expect everyone to walk at the same pace and you will have time for rest stops, especially on walks where there are points of interest on the way.

Safety. Our guides and leaders are experienced at taking people on Summer Programme trips including bush walks and tramping expeditions. There are first aid kits on each trip. The leaders carry a cell phone although coverage cannot be guaranteed. A personal locator beacon is carried on remote trips. Please advise us in advance if you have any medical conditions, e.g. allergies to stings. During the course of the day, if you experience any difficulties, let the leader know so we can act quickly to ensure your safety and comfort.

### Sky Waka / Gondola Ruapehu

#### Wednesday 4 January – *New!*

Sturdy footwear and rain wear. Bring money/card for a meal or BYO drink and food.

Journey into the clouds on New Zealand's largest, enclosed gondola. The Sky Waka travels 1.8km to Knoll Ridge Restaurant. This trip is subject to the Sky Waka operating.

#### Eastern Whanganui Road Trip

#### Thursday 5 January - New! Short beach and bush walks.

Sturdy footwear and rain wear. BYO lunch.

This loop trip takes us first to the seaside settlement of Koitiata (aka Turakina Beach) for lunch. Then we drive up the Turakina Valley and back to Whanganui via Fordell with stops at various points of historic and current interest including a stately house. Learn about the features and sights that exist close to Whanganui which we may never have known were there.

#### Kauarapaoa Trip

#### Friday 6 January. Short Walks - It's Back!

Sturdy footwear and rain wear. BBQ Lunch provided by the Friends of the Whanganui River at Noel Shepherd's House.

Although quite close to Whanganui, the Kauarapaoa Valley seems a world away. We loop via Kai lwi and up past Bushy Park, along the top of the watershed and return down the valley, viewing some of our impressive back country en route. Sid Soulsby of Wairangi Station will share his stories of living in the valley.

### Heritage Trees of Downtown Whanganui

### Saturday 7 January. Guided walk - It's Back!

BYO drink and snack.

Whanganui's heritage, is about more than buildings. Pakaitore/Moutua Gardens and Pukenamu/Queens Park contain many notable trees - some listed as protected. Join amateur botanist Margi Keys for an easy 90-minute stroll to name and marvel at what our forefathers planted long ago.

Depart 2pm from outside the Whanganui Courthouse. Return approx 3.30pm. No booking necessary. Adult \$5 cash • Child \$2 cash

### Opunake Loop Trail

### Sunday 8 January - New!

Reasonable fitness required for 3-4-hour walk.

Sturdy footwear, rain wear, warm clothing and sunhat. BYO lunch, snacks and drinks.

In 2019, the Opunake Lions created this 10km trail as a community project to extend the existing lake and cliff-top walkways to circumnavigate the town. Much of the shared path for cyclists and pedestrians which was wrecked during two storms in February 2022 has been restored. Our walk includes two artist studios and the Pihama Lavender Gardens on the site of the old Pihama dairy factory.

### Rotopounamu / Te Porere Redoubts

Three walks, mostly flat.

Sturdy footwear and rain wear, BYO lunch, morning and afternoon tea.

It's seven years since we last visited the beautiful Rotopounamu (greenstone lake) near Turangi. The two-hour 5km loop walk around the lake is noted for its bush and birdlife. Coming home we explore the earthworks at the historic Te Porere Redoubts, the site of the last battle of the NZ wars in 1869. Sample the new Makotuku Walkway at Raetihi.

#### Whangaehu Beach to Koitiata (Turakina Beach)

#### Monday 16 January - New!

Reasonable fitness required for 2-hour beach walk. Sturdy footwear, rain wear and warm clothing. BYO lunch, snacks and drinks.

Our leisurely stroll along the coast to the beach settlement of Koitiata. Includes discovering botanical treasures pingao and spinifex as well as bird life. To reach the village, we must wade through the mouth of Turakina River at low tide (11am). The lagoon beyond offers more sights for bird lovers.

### **Evening Talk: Exploring the Chathams**

### Tuesday 17 January - New!

Experienced Whanganui traveller Di Harries' visit to the Chatham Islands was a great success with weather cooperating and few tourists due to lockdown. Travelling independently in a hire car, Di and husband Royce Johnson, were able to explore the island thoroughly at their own pace. Three days on Pitt Island was a bonus. Di will share their experiences and show photographs of the landscape and bird life.

### ( Corliss Island )

### Wednesday 18 January. Flat walk - New!

High gumboots useful for short, muddy river crossing. BYO afternoon tea.

This small island in the Whanganui River below the Cobham Bridge has tracks we will explore after crossing at low tide. We will walk from one end of the island to the other and, if lucky, see bird life including spoonbills.

Park beyond the Putiki roundabout on Wikitoria Road where the trip will begin.

### **Bridge to Nowhere**

### Thursday 19 January - Favewrife

### Reasonable fitness required.

Sturdy footwear, rain wear and warm clothing for river journey. BYO lunch and snacks. Hot drinks and water provided at lunch time.

Bus to Pipiriki, followed by 32km jet boat ride and 3km bush walk. The Bridge to Nowhere is a poignant monument to 71 returned soldiers who farmed here after WW1. The Government later withdrew its support and demanded they leave. They were in effect 'dishonourably discharged' with little to show for their efforts. Their houses and farm buildings were burned down to prevent their return.

### Council Chambers Tour

### Friday 20 January - New!

Join a short tour of the Whanganui District Council chambers with its splendid collection of stained glass windows telling 'The Whanganui Story'. Begun in 2006, this project depicts important events and people in our district's history including Johnny Devlin, Kupe, Mother Aubert, Kowhai Park, the Durie Hill Tower and the awa. Our guide will talk about the windows, the history of the chamber and the past mayors, photographs of whom are also displayed.

Coming home, we will visit the beautiful Hollard Gardens, operated by the Taranaki Regional Council, and an amazing horse ornament collection.
